While he apparently has announced that he would join in the battle to defeat Trump, at this point, Sanders needs to simply announce his endorsement of Hillary Clinton.

The issue is very simple. Do you want to help Trump, who is becoming truly scary, or do you want the next President to uphold the values of our Democracy, uphold the Constitution, and maintain a rational foreign policy?

The nomination has effectively been won by Hillary. Sanders lost. He had loads of money and some enthusiastic people and he clearly made a mark in political history. He deserves congratulations for that.

Sanders' staying in the running throughout the convention, however, is simply meanspirited — and all about Sanders and not the reality of graciously accepting defeat and becoming part of a team to defeat Trump, who if elected would result in a national catastrophe.
